Dear Secretary of State,

I am writing on behalf of the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists to seek urgent clarity on the government advice issued by the Prime Minister on 23 March 2020. This advice requires people to stay at home, only to go outside for food, health reasons, or essential work. We are asking you to publish specific guidance on whether construction-related work is considered essential and for advice as to whether companies in our sector should continue to work on site.

Our members are understandably confused and concerned this morning, as different companies interpret the official guidance differently. Many have taken a cautious approach, and have closed sites, at least for the time being. Others are continuing to work.

In the last few days we have been collecting evidence from members as to whether Public Health England advice on social distancing guidance is being effectively followed on some construction sites. We will be doing everything we can to reinforce to our members the need to maintain a safe working environment in line with Government advice, and to remind them of their existing responsibility not to work in conditions they consider unsafe. We would welcome assurances that archaeological companies working on construction sites will not be held liable if they decide that they cannot continue to work safely.

We look forward to hearing from you.
